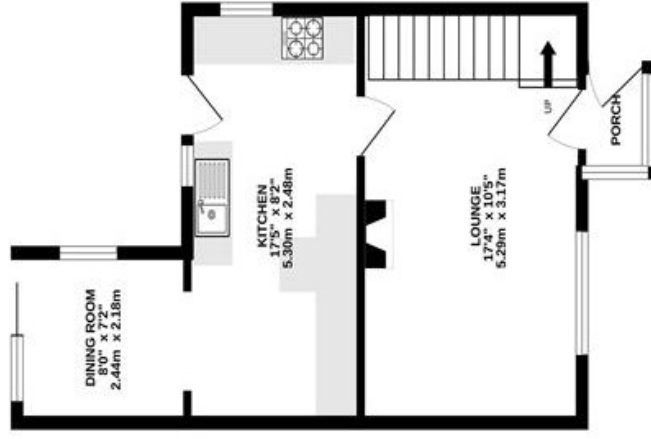
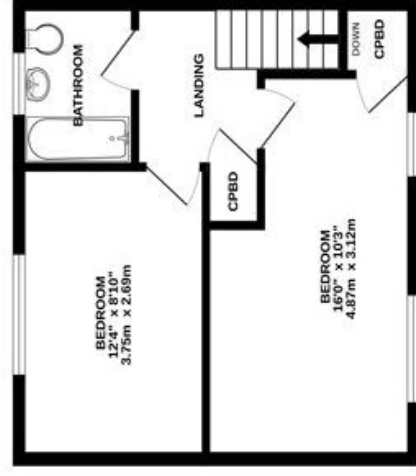


GROUND FLOOR

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DESCRIPTION

In a little more detail, the accommodation on offer comprises an entrance porch opening into the lounge with double glazed window to the front and feature fireplace. The kitchen has a range of wall and base units, integrated oven and hob and opening into the rear extension which is an ideal dining room.

The first floor houses the landing with useful storage cupboard, bedroom one looking out to the front with two double glazed windows, bedroom two looking out to the rear and the family bathroom complete with WC, wash basin and bath with shower over, glass screen and

LOCATION

Chapel-en-le-Frith, known as 'The Capital of the Peak' nestles in an upland valley in the High Peak and is surrounded by a dramatic landscape of gritstone ridges and shapely hills. The town takes its name from a small chapel built in 1225 by the keepers of the Royal Forest that is now the Church of St Thomas Becket, where 1500 Scottish soldiers were imprisoned during the Civil War. The historic town centre also features a traditional marketplace which still has its original renowned stocks which the local cafe takes its name.
