

Local Amenities



Festival Place - situated in the centre of Basingstoke, Festival Place offers numerous shops and eateries. The Town Centre provides a wide variety of Sports & Leisure facilities, and the Basingstoke Leisure Park with cinema, bowling complex, ice rink and swimming can be easily accessed.

Due to Basingstokes thriving economy, the town houses many large private and public sector companies, including The AA, BNP Paribas Leasing Solutions, AXA Wealth, Lenovo, De La Rue Plc, Sainsbury's, Sun Life Financial of Canada, Network Rail Training Centre, GAME, Sony Europe and Fujitsu Services.

There are numerous outdoor amenity locations to suit your recreational needs within Basingstoke. **The War Memorial Park** located in the town centre is perfect for a short walk, a picnic or the weekly 'park run', or a trip to **Eastrop Park** to feed the ducks, sit and have a hot beverage from the on-site coffee shop or hire a row boat.

You don't need to go far in Basingstoke to access the rolling countryside and some beautiful local pubs and restaurants, village walks and heritage sites such as Basing House.



Art, Culture, Nature & Sport


Basingstoke is home to numerous cultural attractions; including the historic Willis Museum (situated in market square, London Street) and the modern and impressive Milestones Museum.

Surrounded by countryside and nature, the 32 mile Basingstoke canal has 29 locks raising the canal by 190 feet through a 17 mile stretch. A popular destination for walkers and cyclists. You are never far from nature in Basingstoke.

Designed to create some of the best acoustics in the country, The Anvil has become one of the leading concert and event venues in the South. Upcoming performances from the likes of Ricky Gervais' are demonstrable of the venues excellent reputation.

If you have a penchant for immersing yourself in local art and culture, then The Haymarket Theatre, is the ideal destination for you. This cultural hub offers a rich tapestry of performances that showcase the creativity of the community set within a stunning period building.


The Town Centre offers a wide variety of Sports & Leisure facilities. Located within Festival Place is the Basingstoke Sports Centre and The Village Gym is located within a short walk on Basing View. 
Further Afield


Making the Connection

Basingstoke provides excellent transport links by both road and rail. It is situated between junctions 6 and 7 of the M3 motorway which provides access to all major routes including the M25, M4 and M27.

By rail, Basingstoke is a mere 45mins from London Waterloo and even less to Reading, Winchester and Southampton.

Education & Services



Basingstoke & North Hampshire Hospital, with A&E Department, Maternity Department and various other departments is situated within easy reach by vehicle or public transport running regularly.

Basingstoke is well-served by numerous doctors' surgeries. Among them, The Rooksdown Practice stands out for its convenient proximity to the hospital. Additional options within the town centre include the Hackwood Partnership, situated on Worting Road, and Brambleys Grange Medical Practice at Crown Heights Medical Centre. These medical facilities contribute to the comprehensive healthcare network available in Basingstoke.
